"It's just ridiculous," Waigl said. She said the state's policy of simply sending a letter is inadequate, particularly because there may be legal consequences if the state or federal government believes someone has voted as a noncitizen. "Citizenship rights, immigration is something I'm interested in for obvious reasons," she said. This isn't the first time voter registration issues have been attributed to the DMV. In 2022, mistakes by the division led to dozens of noncitizens being registered to vote, even if they specifically stated they were nonresidents and ineligible. Some went on to cast ballots in state and local elections. The scale of the new removals is notable. Last year, a copy of the state's inactive voter list showed 541 registrations listed as belonging to possible noncitizens. If 3,500 people were added to the inactive list by the Division of Elections, that would represent more than a 700% increase. The removals caused the state's

active voter roll to shrink between June and July, the first time since at least 2020 that has occurred in an election year, state statistics show. The removals come seven months after Lt. Gov. Nancy Dahlstrom, who oversees the Division of Elections, directed the state to answer a request from the U.S. Department of Justice and turn over extended copies of the state's voter rolls. The Justice Department has made similar requests across the country and intends to share the data with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to check for noncitizens who may have voted illegally. The tool used by DHS is error-prone and has erroneously flagged some citizens, according to an investigation by ProPublica. States led by Democratic officials have accused the federal government of deliberately attempting to raise fear, uncertainty and doubt about state elections systems in order to lay the groundwork for challenges to the 2026 midterm elections. "I'm just truly deeply concerned about this process creating even more distrust in our voter rolls, as if there isn't enough already because of allegations," Rep. Ky Holland, I-An-

chorage, told Beecher on Wednesday. A memo signed by Beecher and U.S. Assistant Attorney General Harmeet Dhillon in December calls for the state to remove voters from the active list if they are specifically identified by the federal government. Civil rights groups sued the state in April over the voter list issue. In June, the state filed a motion to dismiss; that motion is awaiting adjudication. State legislators asked Beecher on Wednesday if the latest removals were at the behest of the federal government. No, said Beecher. "It has nothing to do with that," she said. "The information that we have received is specifically from DMV. Why the voter list or why the list was so large this time, we're not completely sure... we are looking into figuring that out." But, she added, if the federal government were to request a removal, the state would follow the exact same procedure as it used recently. "If we were to get information from them, we would take the same steps of moving them into inactive
